Hartman, J. Stewart, Rev. Rev. J. S. Hartman, Former Orphanage Superintendent, Dies Friday.

COUNTY NATIVE, COLLEGE GRAD

The Rev. J. Stewart Hartman, 69, first superintendent of the Hoffman orphanage, near Littlestown and pastor of the Reformed church at Cavetown, Maryland, died at 10:10 o'clock, Friday evening, at Detour, Maryland, from the effects of a cerebral hemorrhage suffered while driving an automobile four hours earlier.

The Rev. Mr. Hartman was returning to his home in Cavetown from Frederick, where he attended the Frederick fair, having had a number of chickens on exhibition there. He had planned to stop at a garage in Detour to have a lens replaced in a headlight, and was stricken just as he drove up to the garage.

After he was stricken, the Rev. Mr. Hartman was taken to the home of Maurice Wilhide, a cousin, in Detour, when death occurred.

Native of County

The deceased was born in Adams County, a son of the late George Hartman and Mrs. Elizabeth Hartman, of Harrisburg, who is 92 years of age. The Rev. Mr. Hartman's parental home is now the farm of George Conover, between Gettysburg and Littlestown.

The Rev. Mr. Hartman was graduated from Gettysburg college in the class of 1895, and then spent three years at the Reformed theological seminary, Lancaster. His first charge was at New Holland, Lancaster County, where he preached from 1888 to 1891. He then spent eight years in Harrisburg and also served pastorates at Silver Run, Maryland; Woodstock, Virginia, and then came to the Hoffman orphanage as superintendent. He came to the orphanage when it opened in 1910, remaining for six years. Since 1916, he had preached in Cavetown.

Funeral Monday

The Rev. Mr. Hartman was twice married, his first wife, the former Miss Ella Flickinger, Littlestown, having died in 1925. He then married the former Miss Emma Wolfinger, of Hagerstown, Maryland who survives, together with seven children of his first marriage. They are the Rev. George N. Hartman of Cincinnati, Ohio; the Rev. Ralph E. Hartman, of Frederick; Mrs. George Baldwin, of Chestertown, Maryland; Mrs. Clarence C. Smith, Littlestown R. 1; Mrs. Oscar Fogle, Pleasant Hill, Tennessee; Ezra F. Hartman, Philadelphia, and Hugh D. Hartman, of Lancaster.

Two brothers, Dr. George W. Hartman, Harrisburg, and Rufus Hartman, also of Harrisburg, and two sisters, Mrs. George Conover, Littlestown R. D., and Mrs. Harry Keitle, of Harrisburg, also survive.

Funeral services Monday afternoon at 1 o'clock at the Cavetown Reformed church. Interment in Mt. Carmel Cemetery, Littlestown.
